PEYTON SCHOOL DISTRICT 23-JT Board of Education Minutes May 28, 2019 7:00pm Community Room at the CTEF Building

I. CALL TO ORDER/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Board President Frohbieter called the meeting to order at 7:00pm.

II. ROLL CALL

Members present: Mr. Eckelberry, Mr. Frohbieter, Mr. Hanks, and Mrs. Mannering. Mrs. Lee's absence is excused.

III. APPROVAL OF AGENDA-Item C under Discussion Items was added for the Consolidated Application approval. Mr. Hanks made the motion to approve the Agenda as amended. Mr. Eckelberry seconded the motion. All Board Members present voted "aye". The motion passed.

IV. APPROVAL OF MINUTES-Mr. Hanks made the motion to approve the April 23rd and April 30th Meeting Minutes. Mrs. Mannering seconded the motion. All Board Members present voted "aye".

V. APPROVAL OF FINANCIAL ITEMS-Mr. Eckelberry made the motion that we approve the financial items. Mr. Hanks seconded the motion. All Board Members present voted "aye".

B. Mary Krisko-CTE Report-

HB16-1289 Pilot Program has ended. 13 students were certified through the Peyton programs; 35 students received WCA and SP/2s Certifications. The WCA Passport is officially on the CDE for approved student certification for HB18-1266 (Career Development Incentive Program). The MiLL expenses are now claimable for CTE reimbursement. The Middle School Career Exploration Program has been approved. Mr. Bushnell was hired as the auto paraprofessional. Peyton School District entered a partnership with Phil Long to provide internships, tours and job shadows for our automotive students. Steve Levy, Phil Long Executive Director, has joined our advisory committee. We have partnered with Phil Long Corporate who will provide their curriculum models that Mr. Smith will integrate into his class. They met with David Largent, the Owner of Big O Tires in Falcon. He would like to provide tours, job shadows and internships for our students. He also offered to host a car lift training at his facility until our lifts are purchased and installed. He is also a part of our advisory committee. 23 students completed their SP/2 certifications. Perkins purchases will be \$33,205.39. Cabinet Manufacturing-The students in the 3rd year of the Woods Program completed their hand tools and toolboxes. This project was funded through the Nathan Yip Foundation Grant. Six Peyton students completed their WCA Passport Certifications as well as 31 MiLL students. Mr. Cole reviewed the Wood's Curriculum; each student will receive one general math credit for each full year of the Wood's Program they complete. Pikes Peak Business and Education Alliance-PPBEA now fully funded by local districts and housed at Pikes Peak BOCES. They are completing participation in the Talent Found Grant. Over the summer, 25 students from PPBEA school districts were placed in paid/unpaid internships. All students will receive a minimum \$500 stipend for successful completion of their internship which was in the areas of Advanced Manufacturing, Information Technology, and Cyber Security Career Clusters. Pikes Peak Consortium-Peyton is now the fiscal agent for the Pikes Peak Perkins Consortium. Member districts include: Calhan, Cheyenne Mountain, Cripple Creek/Victor, Woodland Park, Peyton, Hanover, Miami-Yoder, Lewis-Palmer, Ellicott, and Edison School Districts. Presentations/Roundtables-Presented Industry Partnerships at Colorado ACTE Summer 2018 Conference hosted Round Table at Work Based Learning as part of Perkins State Plan in March 2019, Region V Conference Bozeman MT in April 2019, and Hosting Round Table Discussion on Work Based Learning for CDE in June 2019 and applied to present at Colorado Counselor Association Conference in October 2019.

C. John Stearns-The MiLL Update-Highlights include-In August 2018, Mr. Stearns worked with Gordon Belt from Stiles Machinery to begin production on adult curriculum. The MiLL will be a training center for companies to send new staff for introductory training. Mr. Stearns taught the MiLL Academy. In September 2018, Mr. Stearns hosted 6 tours of the MiLL, met with Shane Matthews from Master Cabinets, and developed and led the 1st Volunteer Tool Safety Training. In October, Mr. Stearns hosted 3 tours, hosted Wilsonart Fabrication University with all Peyton and MiLL students. In November, 9 tours were hosted at the MiLL including a large group from the Cabinet Makers Association, MiLL Teaching Academy hosted by Todd Sommerfel-Owner of Kreg Tools, traveled to San Antonio to represent Peyton/The Mill at AWFS Education Committee Meeting. In December, the Colorado Association of School Board presented an award to Peyton. January highlights include a visit from Spire Manufacturing and ESI Edgebanding Services as well as the Freshmen Orientation at Widefield High School. February, State CTE director, Sarah Heath attended The MiLL, safety training, recruitment tours, the International Builders Show and Mr. Stearns was able to visit with Eric Thorkilson, the CEO of This Old House. In March, Hosted Skills USA regional competition at the Peyton CTEF location, hosted a tour with Matt Watek, USA Millwork, and discussed adult curriculum planning, American Youth Forum visited both the Peyton and The MiLL locations, Jonathan Lee, TruStile Doors and Mr. Stearns discussed adult curriculum planning. April-Phone conference with AWFS Education Committee, Hosted Festool Education Road Show, Rich Steen a local Cabinet Shop owner is looking to hire students, and hosted another Teaching Academy. In May, met with Don Bigelow, the VP of Cabinet Visions and hosted "signing day" for 3 Peyton students and 4 Widefield students. For the current year The MiLL had 96 students, but for 19-20 they are expecting 175 students.

VII. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT – Mr. Kistler's May report included: \$20,000 in scholarships are available to Woods' Manufacturing students; the end of year lunch went really well; the Peyton Online Graduation was great; and the Elementary will offer Online Classes for the 2019-2020 school year.
